School Profile

Leslieville School is a small, rural school in the Hamlet of Leslieville, Alberta in Clearwater County. The school serves as a central gathering location for the community that consists of people that farm, work in the oil and gas industry and commute to the larger areas such as Rocky Mountain House and Red Deer.

Located within Wild Rose Public School Division, the school provides education to 127 students, including students ranging from Kindergarten to grade 7.

We have incredible community support for all events that happen throughout the year. Our school council works very closely with school staff to provide direction in many areas. Technology is becoming more of a tool for learning in all classrooms. A variety of extracurricular activities and special events occur throughout the year. In addition, students participate in daily physical education and weekly music classes. Physical activity throughout each day is a high priority for all grade levels.

School Issues, Trends & Future Directions

Being a small school will always be an issue in terms of budget as our student enrolment drives the budget. Over the last 8 years the student enrolment has dropped from 180 to as low of 122. This lower enrolment definitely makes budgeting for staffing a real challenge. This is the third year in a row that core subjects have had to be doubled up. At this point this situation has not affected the results on the PAT results for Grade 6. Grade 3/4 and Grade 6/7 are being taught together for all subjects for the first time ever in the 2019/2020 school year. The plan for 2020/2021 will be to have a Grade 4/5 combined and Grade 6/7 combined class.

Chromebooks are provided to all classes on a one-to-one basis and their use as a tool continues to improve throughout all grade levels. All but 3 classrooms have TV's installed for projection from the teachers' computer or from any students/ chromebook.

Comments - Out of 20 measures Leslieville School had 16 results that were higher than the provincial results. An area that continues to be lower for Leslieville School is the percentage of students achieving excellence on the writing portion of the Grade 6 achievement test. 100% of the students achieved the acceptable standard in each of the 4 Grade 6 tests.

2018 - 19 Results Report

Resilience - This is still a continued focus and the same comment as last year applies. Staff spoke to the students about our focus of making sure that students are challenged with age appropriate tasks that will create skills and confidence. The greatest concern had been the trend of parents letting students miss field trips that the child was not comfortable with. Phone calls and face to face communication were made to discuss the importance of attending all field trips. The response by the parents has been supportive for most cases and they are now sending their children even when there is discomfort shown by the child. There are now just a handful of students that attempt to persuade their parents to let them stay at home during field trips or during events that they don't think they will like. Communication with parents has shown some success in this area. This will continue to be a work in progress on a go forward basis. Another trend that we are observing is the increase in students dealing with high anxiety and we will need to work towards supports and training to help all our students. Reason for this work is to counter the "Helicopter Parenting" that is taking place everywhere.

Grade 6 Provincial Achievement results continue to be very strong with the highest results in many years. This Grade 6 class was doubled up with Grade 5's for Language Arts and Math for all of 2018-2019. A result of 100% of students achieving the acceptable standard in both subjects.
